Step 1. FAFSA

15 Students have completed their student aid applications. Diana is working with several classified as foster children to complete their applications. It's a more complex process. Parents abandoned the students (in every case) but still claim them on their taxes! Two additional students received social security matching errors. The financial aid process is our main challenge. Thank you to the Hirz Foundation for the Habit Gift Cards and bus passes given to students completing their FAFSA applications early.

Only US residents are able to the student aid application. Waivers are available for non-residents. Every student has been emailed these two links and had the opportunity to attend workshops held on campus.

Step 2. College Applications

We have 82 students on our senior roster. Approximately 65 have completed their college applications.


12 Irvine Valley College (IVC)

OCC & IVC are harder to navigate. They are large campuses that operate more like a 4 year college. SAC & SCC allow me to pay tuition and assist students through their outreach office.

Challenges:

- ❖ Students sign up for classes that do not correlate with work schedule. Signing up for 3 & 4 classes plus work schedule sets them up for failure.
- ❖ Need more students to complete FAFSA. The cost without is too expensive per student. \$3000 vs \$1000 approximate.
- ❖ Home life (more people in housing unit, more hours working leaves less time for school).
- ❖ Transportation. More are willing to take the bus which is good (free) but more incidence of missing classes. Fewer students want cars (realize not affordable).
- ❖ Food & Housing Insecurity is ever present.



Costs

- ❖ Books. Many are free. Average per student \$180 per term.
- ❖ Tuition. Estimate from Cashiers office. Ranges from \$200-\$1200.
- ❖ Backpack, Calendar & Supplies. \$90 per student.
- ❖ Laptop. Have 15. Maybe 25. District is donating and have from last year. Donation by John Stauffer.
- ❖ Parking Passes. \$70 per term.
- ❖ Bus Passes are free.
- ❖ Gift cards for food on campus.
- ❖ Some programs require specific supplies. Example: Cosmetology \$1500.
- ❖ College shirts. ~ \$15-\$40 per student



Educating students on certificates

- ❖ Automotive. 6 specific certifications available translating to immediate jobs.
- ❖ Apprenticeships. Electrical, Linesman, Water Program, Carpentry, Maintenance
- ❖ Goal is to align jobs with career interests. Students are completing career interest and personality profiler. Results help uncover a wider range of career paths.



Final Thoughts

- ❖ May is tough love month. Students have had all the support we are able give to help them succeed. Challenges have been addressed to the best of our ability.
- ❖ We are honing in on those completing their steps. If they are willing to complete these steps the more likely they are, and able, to show up on campus.
